Working together as a team



Several years ago, at the Calgary Stampede in Canada, something unusual happened during a pulling contest. This particular contest is designed to determine which horse can pull the greatest weight. The winning horse pulled a little over 9,000 pounds, while the second-place horse managed to drag a

little under 9,000 pounds. Afterward, the two owners decided to give the crowd a demonstration of teamwork. They harnessed the two horses to see how much they could pull together. To the crowd's surprise, it wasn't 18,000 pounds. It was 27,000! What a lesson for

the onlookers! Teamwork allows us to accomplish so much more than we might ever dream possible. There is strength in numbers.



1 Cor. 12 and Romans 12 talks about the body concept. We are all different parts of the Body of Christ. God has given us different talents, abilities and spiritual gifts. If we all work together



as a team then we get so much more done for the Kingdom. Remember the words of John Donne (1572-1631) - "*no man is an island*".

Wardrobe Quick Change Game

Needed: 2 (or more) equal sets of <u>large</u> size old clothes e.g. shirt, skirt, jacket, shoes, trousers, etc (6-8 items/set)

Play: Form two (or more) teams with an even number of kids. If you have an odd number of kids, one can be the referee, otherwise the teacher can be the referee. Line up

the teams at one end of the room and place a set of clothing for each team at the opposite end of the room. This will be a race to have each member of the team first put on all the clothes, then quickly take them off so the next person in the team can put them on. The team with their final person



putting on the clothes is the winner. The referee is also important, because he will decide if the player has successfully put on the articles of clothing. Until the referee says OK, the next player in the team cannot begin.

So, what keeps this old fossil going in kid's ministry after more than 30 years full time and 11 years voluntary before that? In the previous Treasure Chest I mentioned ...

Be convinced of your calling Be convinced of your message Be regularly refreshed Be disciplined Be accountable Learn to delegate



Stretch your skills – Never stop learning to be a great kids' worker. Read lots, watch others, attend training courses and network with other likeminded people – 'as iron sharpens iron'.

Build your resources – The more resources you have, the less the stress when ministry demands are made on you. Have a squirrel mentality and bit-by-bit store away useful things you come across. Don't hide them in the back of a cupboard (you'll forget about them) but somewhere in view that has easy access. Maybe even keep a record of what you have and when you used them.

Share your passion, skills and resources – When you see others who are walking the same ministry path as you, encourage them and share what you have with them. Remind yourself that other people invested their time and energies in you, so 'go thou and do likewise'.

Strive for excellence – The longer you are involved in ministry, the greater the temptation to use shortcuts and to do your second best. Working smart is good, but second grade presentations are just not good enough. Why should the greatest message in the world be presented poorly?

Persevere – It was Sir Winston Churchill that reminded the students at Harrow School (October 29, 1941) to "Never give up. Never, ever give up." Galatians 6:9 says, 'Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.' Trust the promises of God. Stick at it!

Rely on God – After having told a Bible story 50 times, you can tend to rely on your own skills and past experience to tell it the 51st time in your own strength. You are involved in a spiritual ministry but, even though experience is a wonderful thing, you cannot win a spiritual battle just using human methods. Also rely on God to empower and enthuse you to keep on 'flying with wings as eagles' (Isaiah 40:31).

CHOOSING CURRICULUMS a few points to consider

Are the goals/ objectives of the lessons "SMART": specific, measurable, attainable, realistic, timely?

Are lessons based on biblical truths?

Is the perspective in line with your church denomination?

Will the lesson engage your students?

Do the lessons help children develop deeper relationships with God, each other, their parents, etc?

Do the lessons actively involve the children?

Are the lessons applicable to your student's daily life in the 21st century?

Do the lessons appeal to a variety of learning styles?

Do the lessons make students feel good about themselves when they are finished?

Does the curriculum include appropriate worship and devotion ideas?

Are the activities fun for your students?

Are songs suggested that the students would enjoy?

Are crafts/ activities age-appropriate?

Are materials included or readily available?

Do games/ activities "tie" to the Bible Story?

Is the curriculum suitable for the size of your class?

Choosing Curriculums ... a few comments

Be careful about choosing a curriculum that has everything done for you as that means you may become slack in your preparation and in owning the program. Teachers become tempted then to just read the presentation. That's a no-no!!!

Be careful in using a 'multimedia only' course as that can lose the relational component between teacher & students during your presentation. Good multimedia is wonderful (use it), but it should be there as a supplement/ support to your presentation and not the main format of teaching (which should be person to person). For me, I only allow multi-media as the main medium of about 20-25% of the presentation part of the program - the rest should be 'human' presentation which uses other forms of visuals to assist. Ensure there is engagement by the kids which can often be lost when relying solely on a DVD presentation.
